With Claude Monet: The Truth of Nature, the Denver Art Museum is home to the most comprehensive U.S. exhibition of Monet paintings in more than two decades. The exhibition, which features more than 120 paintings spanning Monet's entire career, focuses on the celebrated French Impressionist artist's enduring relationship with nature and his response to the varied and distinct places in which he worked.

His journeys to varied places-including the rugged Normandy coast, the sunny Mediterranean, London, the Netherlands, and Norway-inspired artworks in the presentation, providing visitors the chance to explore Monet's continuous interest in capturing quickly changing atmospheres, the reflective qualities of water, and the effects of light. Throughout his long life (1840–1926), Monet did not just happen upon inspiring places; he sought them, he chose them, and he painted them, at times over and over again, committed to understanding that most elusive of subjects: the truth of nature.

The same creative well that inspired painter Claude Monet to see landscapes in a new way also shaped a generation of French writers and composers. Monet's musical counterpart is, undoubtedly, Claude Debussy.

Debussy turned the tables of modern music with his ground-breaking *Prelude to the Afternoon of a Faun* (1894). The piece is dreamy and sensual. There are no hard edges. It's nearly impossible to tap your toe to it. No wonder conductor Pierre Boulez thought the piece marked the beginning of modern music when he said "the flute of the faun brought new breath to the art of music."

Impressionism in music certainly isn't limited to Claude Debussy. Before Debussy's *Prelude*, composers Erik Satie and Gabriel Fauré anticipated Impressionism in their music. And Maurice Ravel followed the path begun by Debussy, twelve years his senior.

We hope you enjoy this collection of Impressionist masterpieces. We are delighted to include five Debussy piano pieces recorded by Denver native Katie Mahan. Katie brings a deep knowledge of musical Impressionism to her performances.
